Deb and I would like to wish everyone a very Happy New Year! Hopefully you will find this year graces you, your family and friends with everything you need for a happy and healthy year.

As many folks do, we make some New Year's resolutions or in our case New Year goals. We try to keep them simple and achievable, but also challenging so they are not simply a gimme. You know those kind of goals, the one like; "I resolve to eat one less cookie this year". Worthy, but not always practical.

No, for me I have a couple I would like to share. One of my goals is to continue to ride my bike and increase my miles for 2016 by a minimum of 30%. I rode over 1500 miles in 2015, the equivalent of riding from Meadow Wood Farms to my Dad's home in Omaha. So for 2016 that means I'll be pushing 2000 miles this year. I know you'll see me around the hood wearing a groove in our new pavement.

Let's all make it a goal this year of keeping up on our properties a little better. Is your fence falling down? Are boards missing, broken or dangling? Does your yard look like it's in constant need of mowing? Take a look at it from a good neighbor view and ask yourself, what statement am I making? That is a worthwhile goal which will benefit all of us. Not only will you feel better about your property and be able take pride in your property and efforts, your neighbors in MWF will thank you as well.

Remember, if you are going to replace your fence, or add a new one; please make sure you adhere to the MWF By-Laws listed in Article IV, Section 3, #5 regarding frontal fencing. The Deed Restrictions and By-Laws apply to everyone, not just Association members. The frontal fencing form and By-Laws can be found on our website under the Resource tab.

Meadow Wood Farms needs your help. After the first of February we will be replacing all of the frontal fencing and adding a wider driveway gate at Friendship Park. The Association has purchased the materials, but the labor must come from us. We would love to see you join us to help get this project done in a timely manner.

Further, we will be pouring a concrete pad in front of the sheds to facilitate getting the tables and chairs out. This will also be done sometime after the first of February.

We will be sending out reminders and further information once a date has been established. There will be signup sheets at the January Association meeting as well. Pitch in and lend a hand or two. The more the merrier. This offer is open to members and non-members as the park benefits all of us. You can contact any Board member to add your name to the volunteer list.





MWF Yummy Recipes...

Baked Carmel Corn

6 quarts Popped Popcorn, 2 cups firmly packed Brown Sugar, 1 t. Salt, 1 cup (2 sticks) Butter or Oleo

1/2 cup light or dark Corn Syrup, 1 t. Vanilla

Have oven heated 250 degrees. Coat the bottom and sides of large roasting pan.

In a large saucepan, slowly melt butter; stir brown sugar, corn syrup and salt.

Bring to a boil, stirring constantly; boil without stirring for 5 mins. Remove from heat; stir in baking soda and vanilla. Gradually pour over popcorn, mixing well. Bake for 1 hour, stirring well after every 15 mins. Remove from oven; cool completely. Break apart...

An Open Letter to the Residents of MWF who own pets...

So an offer to "help Sandy" has turned into an almost full time "Occupation". However, it takes a village-and this one has responded. My heartfelt thanks to the folks in our neighborhood who have cared enough to pay attention to animals out there "on their own" and taken appropriate action. Most calls are concerning dogs and I have hosted several at my home temporarily. Some "repeat offenders" are well known and simply to respective owners. The more worrisome are those with no means of identification - when there is no response to email posts on the MWF site, I have reluctantly turned them over to Animal Control. I do follow up by phone– two dogs are presently for adoption (Traveler and #159489).

Moving forward in 2016—a resident on Lake View Drive has offered to donate a dog kennel for use on my property, which will be greatly appreciated. (It isn't here yet, so don't even think about it). This will allow me to confine a dog temporarily in safe surroundings without exposing it to my own animals. There has also been an offer of donations and I will be happy to accept the following types of items:

- 1. clean throw rugs, towels, or blankets as crate/doghouse liners (old ones that you would otherwise discard)
- 2. Sturdy food/water bowls
- 3. Collars/leashes (lead ropes also work well with larger dogs)
- 4. Dog Kibble

I am not intending to set up an actual "rescue" because I cannot take on the Financial responsibility for healthcare that these animals often need. However, sending a dog away with that Animal Control Truck reduces me to tears— Yes, I would like to save them all! The "good" news is that Marion County Animal Services does not immediately euthanize an animal they pick up unless it is a case of clear aggression, severe illness or injury. It is checked for a microchip, held as a "stray" for 3 days, and then neutered, given immunizations, and "cleaned up". It is then made available for adoption— the photos are posted on their website, Petfinder, and possibly other rescue sites.

Hoping all of you have had a wonderful Christmas Season and that 2016 will be a very good year for all of our neighbors—human and otherwise. I would like to request that any of you have not completed the registry form for your pet (s), do so in the New Year. That information may assure that you quickly get your pet back if he/she "escapes" at some point—we all say that won't happen—but unpredictable circumstances do arise.

The tobacco companies in Connecticut and Massachusetts (USA) had been doing this for years. Just how long, I don't know. But in 1957, personnel from the Hathaway and Steen Corporation came to our high schools in Western Pennsylvania (USA) and gave a presentation to our parents about having us work in the tobacco industry for the summer. We teenagers would be gone from home for 6-7 weeks and WORK and get paid. The boys would pick the huge leaves of the tobacco plant, the girls would sew the huge leaves onto laths, and other immigrants from the Islands (Jamaica, Puerto Rico, Haiti, etc) would hang the laths to dry in the upper part of the tobacco barn. YES! We were immigrant workers from one state to another!

We were housed in camps – girls by themselves, and boys by themselves – we didn't even know where other camps were. We were always under strict supervision from our "counselors", who were teachers doing a summer job too.

I was shocked that my parents allowed me to go. And my younger sister too. We were 15 and 16 years old. Girls from north to south in Western PA went. I met a lot of girls, most of whom ended up going to college - some doing great things. Some with whom I still communicate. (Over 56 years now!)

I felt very lucky to be housed at Camp Berkshire. It was on a beautiful lake where we could go swimming sometime. Mostly though, we worked. We had to get up at 5 am, clean our quarters, go to breakfast, catch the bus to our work site, and WORK! This was hard, dirty work. We had to sew pairs of huge tobacco leaves, with 4-inch needles that sometimes missed the spot and hit our hands! Got tar over our arms, hands, and fingers. Then had to wash them with bleach after work. After dinner we had to wash the stainless eating trays, which were then INSPECTED by the nurse (full time), and if they did not pass inspection, they got sent back to us! We had to wash our clothes by hand. We had to make our beds every morning, and had chores about cleaning up, which were rotated around, so everybody had to do everything at some time or another.

We were escorted to "town" on Friday night where we could go shopping. We had to pay our room and board first, which was taken out of our pay, along with social security tax. (We thought we would get that back, but it's still in there!) We were escorted to church (of our choice) on Sunday. And once in a great while we would have a field trip, like to the ocean! We were also allowed to walk to a nearby small grocery store after dinner if we wished. It was about a mile and half away, but we WALKED! There was a "canteen" to buy candy. There were swimming lessons provided. What a great time we had. And we didn't have time to look for mischief. AND hardly anybody smoked.

Altogether, it was quite an experience. Everybody went home at the end of the season, including the guys from the Islands, with whom we had become friends too. Our parents were shocked when we made our beds every morning, etc.

IMAGINE, TEENAGE MIGRANT WORKERS, FROM STATE TO STATE!!!

Teenagers, given a job and a decent place to live, food to eat, and a chance to learn and meet new people. PERHAPS this idea could be used now when "workers" are needed for local farms, seasonal pickings, like blueberries, strawberries, lettuce, apples, fruit, vegetables, etc. I'm not sure that teenagers today could be trusted as we were to live 500 miles from home. But maybe, maybe, we could put some teenagers to work and let them get some self-confidence and pride in themselves. If they would work.....


