

Loose Dogs - Again!

It's the stuff of nighmares: you and your (leashed) dog are out for an easy-going stroll around the neighborhood when a loose dog appears out of nowhere and is heading your way. Or in the case of many MWF residents, you are out for a ride and your horse is startled by a loose dog that wants to nip at the heels of your mount. Either situation could quickly escalate into a catastrophe, with several serious situations having already occurred.

More than a few residents have expressed concern for themselves and their pets, as well as concern for the dogs at large, who could easily be hit by a passing vehicle. It isn't unusual for individuals to feel the need to carry pepper spray, walking sticks, and/or tasers as a means of protection against loose dogs. And it is shameful that anyone should feel the need to send out a patrol to "clear the perimeter" for a walk! Once one of the most appealing activities for MWF residents, walking our dogs can now be one of the most stressful.

According to Marion County Code, the keeper of a dog commits a civil infraction if the keeper's dog commits any of the following:

- Runs at large
- Chases a person or a vehicle while off the keeper's property
- Trespasses onto private property
- Damages or destroys property while at large
- Scatters garbage while at large
- Creates a disturbing level of noise
- Is a potentially dangerous dog

Such an infraction may result in official notice and a summons to appear for a hearing. In addition to fines and court fees, the dog owner may be required to take corrective actions to avoid future infractions. Examples range in severity from requiring completion of a dog behavior and training class to relocating or even euthanizing the dog. In the case of repeated violations, the owner may be restricted from owning or keeping a dog in Marion County for a period of time.

Sadly and despite all of these potential negative outcomes, this issue is dividing our community when, in fact, we should be coming together to resolve the situation. Let's not wait for something devastating to occur to make a change. If one of our neighbors is struggling to contain a dog due to their own age, illness, disability, or lack of funds, we have other neighbors (MWF Angels) who would be willing to help with a one-time project, maybe to repair a fence. There are a number of experienced dog owners and trainers in the neighborhood who can easily refer others to excellent dog training classes. Raise a hand for help; lend a hand to see improvements. We can fix this if we work together!

As for dining, we much prefer our own cooking at home but managed to visit a few of our favorite local establishments. 
