Our Meadow Wood Memory Walkers will be participating in the **Ocala, Florida 2022 Walk to End Alzheimer's**. Our team of walkers, with the financial support of friends, family, and community members, has been one of the top teams for seven years now. Please consider joining and helping us raise funds to support the objectives of the Alzheimer's Association.

Again, this year we will be walking within our own community. We will meet at Friendship Park on East Lake View Drive at **8:30 am on Saturday**, November 5<sup>th</sup>. The walk, which is optional, is less than two miles. Dogs, cats, horses, and well-behaved adults are invited. If you cannot walk, drive your golf cart, ride a horse, or just hang out and enjoy the company of your neighbors. All registered team members who raise \$100 or more will receive a commemorative t-shirt mailed to their address. We will have a support vehicle with cold drinks and snacks.

Hurricane Ian Help for Horsemen

The horror of a hurricane. It can cause major damage and personal anguish. But with modern day technology, we are kept informed so that we can prepare as best as possible. At the end of September our area was warned of a coming storm that led us all to stock drinking water, get generators working, and buy canned goods. I thought I would be celebrating a wedding anniversary by candle-light, not as a part of a romantic dinner, but because I anticipated the power would be out.

Hurricane Ian was the second deadliest hurricane to hit the continental US, behind Hurricane Katrina. Almost 100 people died in Florida. Our area, though prepped and ready, was relieved when the path of the storm went further south, and at just shy of 150 MPH, it came ashore at Fort Myers.

Horse owners across the state feared for their horses' safety as many farms leave their animals out 24/7. The World Equestrian Center (WEC) opened its barns and hearts as a safe haven from the storm for those who needed stalls. Three thousand horses and other animals from all across the state from Tallahassee to areas south of Tampa were relocated there for protection. WEC didn't charge for the stalls and offered stall shavings and meals at a nominal rate. The onsite veterinary clinic was available for any animal medical issue.

Farms in the Venice and Fort Myers area were especially hard hit. Few people had enough notice to evacuate in time. One woman was missing her horse and donkey from the storm. Horse people stepped in, helping her search on foot, by boat, using drones, and reporting her loss on social media. Hundreds of horsemen across the country posted her story. Debi Metcalf, Founder at Stolen Horse International-NetPosse Missing and Stolen Equine shared her loss with members. Unfortunately, her story did not have a happy ending. While her donkey was located unharmed, her beloved horse was found days later, deceased from the effects of the storm when 9 feet of water filled his pasture.

Another example of horsemen helping horsemen is the story of the Childer family from Daytona. Severe flooding necessitated their leaving their home without any clothing or shoes. They evacuated to WEC whereupon other families taking refuge there rose to the occasion and provided clothing and other items. Their 30 horses followed in trailers arranged by other helping hands. Many other donations continued to flow in after the storm while their farm was still underwater.

Louisa Barton of The Horse Talk Show and Equine Initiatives of Ocala started a GOFUNDME page to solicit donations for supplies for horse farms in south Florida. Horse lovers opened their hearts and their wallets, with one anonymous donor offering up twenty thousand dollars.

AND in our own neighborhood, residents gathered up tack and other necessary barn items to be brought to the Florida Horse Park, under the direction of our own Frenchie, for donation to those horse owners who lost just about everything from the storm. Trailer loads of hay and grain were coordinated by Larsen Farms and other feed dealers.

Horse owners rallied together to help other horsemen. These stories help to restore our faith in humanity. Although hurricanes can be horror-canes, adequate preparation, staying well informed and having an evacuation plan, if necessary, can go a long way towards alleviating anxiety and being able to "ride out the storm".




## **Car Show, Concert & Food**



## **VOTING UPDATE FROM YOUR PRECINCT CLERK**

**Tuesday, November 8<sup>th</sup>** is the date of the 2022 General Election. Unlike the primary election, **ALL** registered Marion County voters will be eligible to vote a ballot determined by their address within the county. For Meadow Wood Farms residents, the ballot will be comprised of the following choices:

United States Senator for Florida

Representative in Congress for District 3

Governor and Lieutenant Governor of Florida

Attorney General of Florida

Chief Financial Officer of Florida

**Commissioner of Agriculture** 

Florida State Senator for District 9

Board of County Commissioners for District 2 and District 4 (elected at large)

Whether or not to retain five Florida Supreme Court justices, six District Court of Appeal judges, and one Marion County judge

Approval or disapproval of three Constitutional Amendments

Approval or disapproval of continuing a one mill ad valorem tax for the School District

Voters in this election must have registered prior to October 11, 2022. Vote By Mail requests must have been received by the Supervisor of Elections by October 29<sup>th</sup>.

To confirm ALL the details of your current voter registration status, and to view your own sample ballot, go to the Marion County Supervisor of Elections website:

Click on the "VOTERS" button on the banner, and then on "Check My Registration Status" and follow the instructions to check your address, verify your party affiliation, view your polling place and sample ballot, request a Vote By Mail ballot, and more.

The options for casting your vote include voting by mail, Early Voting, and voting on Election Day, November 8<sup>th</sup>. Mail ballots can be mailed, dropped off at the Elections office, or deposited in a special Secure Ballot Intake Station receptacle at any Early Voting site during Early Voting hours. However, mailed ballots must reach to Elections office by 7 pm on Election Day.

Early Voting will take place at nine locations throughout the county, starting on Thursday, October 27th and ending on Saturday, November 5th from 8 am to 6 pm every day. Voters may go to ANY Early Voting location to cast their ballot. The locations are listed at the Supervisor of Elections web site above.

Finally, of course, Meadow Wood Farms residents are welcome to come and visit us in person on Election Day! Polls will be open from 7 am to 7 pm, and our staff will include several familiar MWF faces. The polling location for ALL Meadow Wood Farms residents is at St. Johns United Methodist Church, 12390 West Highway 328, in the large community room (entrance on the left as you face the community building). See you there!
