On Saturday, Oct 14th our community team, the Meadow Wood Memory Walkers, participated in the annual Ocala Walk To End Alzheimer's. Our team of current and former MWF residents and family received contributions amounting to \$9,485 – just shy of our 10K goal. A total of close to \$130,000 was raised to help in the fight against this horrendous disease.

music, and canine obedience demonstrations made the event a lot of fun. We, as a team, have decided to return to WEC next year. We welcome everyone to join us – along with friends and family members from outside MWF.

Veterans Day - Armistice Day The 11th hour of the 11th month

Veterans Day in the United States due to the influence of a famous World War I poem called "In Flanders Fields," written by Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae, a Canadian physician and soldier. The poem vividly describes the poppies growing amidst the graves of soldiers in Flanders, a region in Belgium heavily affected by the war.

Here is the poem:

"In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the Dead. Short days ago, we lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe: To you from failing hands we throw The torch; be yours to hold it high. If ye break faith with us who die We shall not sleep, though poppies grow In Flanders fields."

This poem became a symbol of remembrance for those who died in World War I and, later, for all military personnel who have died in the service of their country. The red poppy, a wildflower that grows in disturbed soil, became a symbol of sacrifice and remembrance because of this poem.

The significance and historical context of these observances may differ as well. Here are some examples of how Veterans Day is observed in different countries:

In Canada, United Kingdom, South Africa and Australia it is called Remembrance Day. In New Zealand and Belgium, it is called Armistice Day. In France it is called Jour de L'Armistice. In India it is called Armed Forces Flag Day (Dec. 7th) and in Germany it is Volkstauertag (People's Mourning Day, the second Sunday in November). The names, dates, and traditions may vary, but the underlying purpose remains the same, to pay tribute to those who have served their country in the military.

6. Addressing Concerns and Issues


