

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Fly Fishing

At the end of last month, that being May, my wife and I met my best buddy from college and his sig other in Highlands, NC. So that you don't have to look it up on MapQuest, I'll tell you that it's about 9 miles north of the Georgia – North Carolina border roughly 2 hours north of Atlanta. It's in the North Carolina "mountains" at just over 4100 feet of elevation. And that, ladies and gentlemen, is why it's called "Highlands." Go figure.

It's a small touristy town not far from Cashiers, NC, another even smaller tourist town. Apparently, these two towns exist primarily as getaways for Atlanta folks to escape the summer heat. They are largely populated by upscale restaurants and women's fashion shops – also mostly upscale. On the more important side for us, the area is also a sports person's haven. We scheduled a guided fly-fishing excursion, a mountain hike – largely uphill as I recall – and a mountain bike trail ride, which unfortunately was rained out. As such, we substituted a very nice lunch at a cool brewpub in Cashiers with a stop at a reclamation and antique operation on the way back to our cabin.

But as usual, I digress. The fly-fishing adventure was just that – an adventure. My wife, Merry Lee, and I had done something very similar in Park City, Utah almost exactly 6 years before. Our companions were experiencing fly fishing for the first time. None of us are fishermen otherwise. Using Brookings Outfitters for the necessary equipment and guides, we set out to find some fish.

Donning our waders and boots at the selected site we ventured into the river, whose name I can neither pronounce nor remember. Fly rods, instructions, and continual support were provided by our very capable and gregarious guides. We ended up splitting up with one guide per couple and separated ourselves by several yards and then more-so, hoping to avoid hooking each other with our errant casts. We were successful on that count, but two of the four of us (who shall remain unidentified) managed to lose their balance in the fast-moving water and slippery rocks. It's interesting how quickly waders can fill up with water if you are sitting in it. Ultimately, we each caught some trout, among them brown, brook, and rainbow. It was truly a fun and memorable adventure.

Using the experience as a metaphor, I've discovered that life can be very much like fly fishing. While the ultimate goal may be to catch a fish or two, that really doesn't happen very often. To thoroughly enjoy the experience, much as in life, you need to feel the joy of being in nature. Success can come not from catching the fish, but from simply casting your fly and having it land precisely where you intended. It's a much smaller goal, but hopefully leads to the bigger one. It also allows you to truly enjoy the experience – the journey, if you will. The fact is that you will cast that fly thousands of times in a given period of time and may only hook a few fish. And then you have to actually land them. Like fly fishing, life is replete with trying, failing, falling in the water, and getting up and doing it again. The key is enjoying the process. I know we did – and do.

NEIGHBOR SUBMISSION

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Our new Association President, Gena DeCamella, asked me -as a resident, friendly, real estate agent- to comment on the current market in our subdivision. Most of you already know me, but for those of you who don't, following is a little of my background.

My husband, Buddy, and I moved here from Long Island in 2001. At the time, we were breeding and racing thoroughbreds, so Ocala with its extensive horse industry, seemed the logical location to resettle.181 acres of historic property, between County Road 328 and SR 40, had been subdivided after the recent death of landowner, the legendary Fred Hooper, who had lived to the ripe old age of 102. Part of that land is now known as Oaks & Meadows. We chose 13 acres along CR 328, across from MWF's first entrance, as the place to set down new roots here in Ocala. We built a nice home and barn large enough for several boarders. After 15 years of working a large farm, we were ready to downsize. We had long determined that Meadow Wood Farms would be our next destination. Among the 15-25 properties normally for sale in 2011, we chose the log house on Never Bend. Somehow, we quickly outgrew our 1.6 acres. Fortunately, we had already purchased the wooded lot on Middle Ground Rd. where we eventually built and moved into our existing farm.

I became a licensed Realtor in 2007. I have mostly sold horse farms. With high interest rates and the uncertainty of the upcoming presidential election, and recent property price reductions, there is some understandable concern regarding the current status of the local market. I feel that Meadow Wood Farms is a unique micro climate for real estate for the following reasons.

In the 1990's, Marion County placed a moratorium on the division of new lots in the county to be a minimum 10 acres. Finding small parcels has become a challenge.

The Ocala sales tax rate is lower than the state average.

The improvements to our roads were a measurable upgrade to our property values and the assessments are soon to be paid off.

The arrival of the World Equestrian Center in 2021, has put Ocala on the map. In the next 3 years we are expected to have an explosion of new residential homes. With our close proximity, and maintaining a quiet environment, helps to hold, if not increase our property values. Consequently, horse properties vs non-horse properties will command higher prices.

Even for non-horse residents though, Meadow Wood Farms offers a comfortable lifestyle that is in close proximity to a plethora of cultural options, restaurants and other activities.

While potential buyers are staying put for now, with their current low interest rates on their existing homes, I am optimistic that we can hold our own in this market.
