



WHAT'S IN YOUR ATTIC?

Our house was built in 1977. Most of the duct work is original. That's 48 years of dust bunnies, dirt and... whatever other ugly gross things settled up there in the ductwork and vents. The coils on our air handler were black, but our system was faithfully chugging along and pumping all this cruddy air thru the house.

We asked around and got some estimates and a recommendation for someone to clean the system. (Note: It was NOT Stanley Steemer: they came and counted the air vents, took about 15 minutes to come up with an outrageous price and left.)

We asked Air Fresh Dryer & Vent Cleaning to come take a look. The company owner, Ozzie, came and looked at *everything*. He was extremely thorough. He took apart the air handler to check out the coils, climbed up in the attic and looked over the duct work, inside and out, and checked all the vents in the house. He took pictures. He explained everything in detail. His estimate was reasonable. Our system is now cleaned, sealed, sanitized and working at maximum efficiency.

Hurricane preparedness for Florida horse owners

Florida's hurricane season is active from June through November, and horse owners must be prepared. Here's a comprehensive guide to help you protect your horses and property:

1. Plan your evacuation route and destination early

- Identify your flood evacuation zone and determine the safest routes and destinations well in advance.
- Evacuate at least 48 hours before hurricane-force winds arrive, as transporting horses in high winds is dangerous.
- Consider pre-registering at a designated equestrian shelter if available in your county, or arrange for boarding at a facility outside the projected path of the hurricane.
- Have multiple backup options for shelter in case your first choice becomes unavailable.
- Coordinate with local haulers or neighbors if you don't have a trailer or enough space.
- Practice loading horses onto trailers regularly to reduce stress during emergencies.

2. Prepare your horses

Ensure horses are current on core vaccinations and have necessary health certificates and negative Coggins tests. Have multiple forms of identification, including microchips, luggage tags braided into manes or tails, spray paint, and photos highlighting unique marks. Use leather or breakaway halters and consider bell boots. If sheltering in place, leave horses in a large, clear pasture on high ground, away from overhead hazards.

3. Prepare your barn and property

Secure your barn by checking roofs, reinforcing doors and windows, and removing loose objects that could become projectiles. Turn off utilities like electricity and water, and deactivate electric fences. Clean gutters and drains to prevent flooding. Ensure fences are sturdy and in good repair, avoiding barbed wire or electric fencing during the storm. Consider a hand pump or generator for water access.

4. Stock up on supplies

Store 12-20 gallons of clean water per horse per day for 7-10 days, using methods like filling garbage cans with liners and adding a small amount of bleach if needed. Have at least 72 hours of feed and hay (preferably 7 days), storing hay on pallets with tarps and grain in airtight containers. Prepare an emergency kit with first aid supplies, tools like a chainsaw and hammer, and basic items like flashlights, extra halters, and fly spray. Keep important documents like ownership papers and health records in a watertight envelope.

5. Post-hurricane recovery

After the storm, check on horses for injuries, stress, or dehydration. Use safe water sources and inspect feed for contamination. Clean up hazards like downed fences and debris before turning horses out. Monitor for health issues such as colic or hoof problems. Document any damage with photos for insurance. Contact your veterinarian immediately for injured or missing animals.

Proactive hurricane preparation is essential to minimize risks for your horses and property during Florida's hurricane season.
